We as Arrowmen stubbornly persist in treading the harder path because we understand that our country and the world needs the sort of values that we learn in Scouting and the Order of the Arrow. As we set forth in this, our Order’s second century, let us remember the admonition of our founder:

“Things of the spirit are what count: brotherhood – in a day when there is too much hatred at home and abroad; cheerfulness – in a day when the pessimists have the floor and cynics are popular; service – in a day when millions are interested in getting or grasping, rather than giving.”

Wachtschu Mawachpo lodge is a relatively young lodge, but we have a rich history of service both within Scouting and without. From region chiefs to ordinary Arrowmen, from grizzled Vigil Honor members to brand-new twelve-year-old Ordeal members, we all should be proud of our lodge and its accomplishments. We hope that this history will both memorialize the lodge’s past and inspire future generations of Arrowmen to reach new heights of cheerful service.

PREFACE

Welcome to the revised and updated lodge history of Wachtschu Mawachpo Lodge 559! The lodge has spent countless hours researching and updating this history, consulting both national and local records and sources to ensure that it is as accurate as possible. However, some of those sources are incomplete for a variety of reasons, so this history necessarily is incomplete as well. You can help us to make this history as complete as possible. We would like to have any names, dates, anecdotes, or other information that can broaden and enrich our history, because, after all, this is **your** history. WESTARK AREA COUNCIL HISTORY

Westark Area Council originally was organized in July 1920. The territory at that time included only the city of Fort Smith and the name of council was "Fort Smith Council".

Early in 1922, the council territory was extended to include the city of Van Buren. The council then became known as the "Fort Smith-Van Buren Council".

The council boundaries remained unchanged for five years until the council re-registered in January 1927. At that time, the council was extended to include all of Crawford and Sebastian Counties, together with that portion of Franklin County south of the Arkansas River. The council's name remained unchanged.

In December 1928, the council took over thirteen additional counties, which included the Counties of Polk, Pope, and Scott and the ten counties that had previously constituted the "Ozark Council" in the northwest part of Arkansas. These additional counties were Benton, Washington, Carroll, Boone, Madison, Newton, Franklin (north half), Johnson, Logan, and Yell.

The Council was re-registered in 1929 under the name of the "Northwest Arkansas Council". This was changed at re-registration time in 1930 to the "Fort Smith Area Council". Since the time of the Council's re-registration in 1937, the Council has been known as the "Westark Area Council". On June 23, 1947, the Council was incorporated in the State of Arkansas as the "Westark Area Council, Inc., Boy Scouts of America".

During the 1950s and 1960s, several changes to the makeup of Westark Area Council occurred. In January 1955 Mena and Polk Counties were transferred to the Caddo Council in Texarkana, Arkansas. For a brief time beginning in 1953, Pope County became a part of Quapaw Area Council before returning to Westark in January 1957. Finally, Fulton County transferred to Eastern Arkansas Area Council on August 1, 1965.

The Westark Area Council today consists of the following counties: Baxter, Benton, Boone, Carroll, Crawford, Franklin, Johnson, Logan, Madison, Marion, Newton, Pope, Scott, Searcy, Sebastian, Washington, and Yell.

A campaign for the building of a new Boy Scout camp was conducted in 1953 and 1954. Land for the camp was purchased and developed into Camp Orr. Camp Orr has been in use since 1955 and covers approximately 600 acres within the Buffalo National River. Camp Orr is the only Boy Scout camp situated within a national park. Camp Orr features access to the Buffalo River and the Buffalo River Trail. In addition to traditional summer camp activities, Camp Orr also recently developed nearly twenty miles of mountain biking trails within the camp property.

The Scout Service Center in Fort Smith was built in 1963.

The State Legislature passed a bill on March 1973, permitting the Westark Area Council to purchase 2,842 acres of Booneville Sanatorium land for future camp development. The drive to develop this land began in the fall of 1975 and completed in May 1976. Construction of the camp, now known as Rogers Scout Reservation, started in the spring of 1976 and is home to weekend camping and features Cub Scout-friendly areas and activities.

LODGE HISTORY

FOUNDING OF THE LODGE

Wachtschu Mawachpo Lodge 559, Lodge of the Mountain Treasure, began in 1963 as the vision of two men: Arthur Anderson and Harry Martens. The driving force behind the founding of the lodge was Arthur Anderson. Anderson was a Vigil Honor member of Manu Lodge 133 prior to moving to Arkansas. He brought his passion for Boy Scouting and the Order of the Arrow with him from Oklahoma to the Ozark Mountains and Camp Orr. Anderson, along with Harry Martens, a Brotherhood member, made Wachtschu Mawachpo Lodge a reality. Martens, the first lodge adviser, received the Vigil Honor the year following the founding of the lodge. Anderson and Martens began the new lodge with the guidance of staff adviser Bill Baird.

Because of the multitude of white oak trees found at Camp Orr and in the Ozark Mountains, the new lodge chose the white oak leaf as the lodge totem. The lodge name, Wachtschu Mawachpo, means “Mountain Treasure”. Westark Area Council's mountain treasure is Camp Orr, and on each step of an Arrowman's journey, he is protected by the shade of the mighty white oak. The white oak has long been a symbol of strength and longevity; as such, the totem was wisely chosen.

The first lodge chapters were Butterfield, Northwest, Ozark, and Magazine Mountain. The first Lodge Chief was Don Ford of Fayetteville. The chapters at that time were large for a young lodge. Butterfield Trail had twenty members with Barry Coplin of Fort Smith as chapter chief. Northwest had thirty-six members with Dick Ford as chapter chief. Ozark had twenty-five members and Marshall Smith served as chapter chief. Magazine Mountain had twenty-three members with Don King as its chapter chief. The Northwest chapter soon changed its name to Uark. Later, the chapter changed its name again to Razorback as it is presently known. In 2015, following the division of Razorback district that created Cornerstone and Razorback districts, the lodge decided to do likewise with Razorback Chapter, creating Razorback Chapter and Cornerstone Chapter to match the council's district makeup. Although Magazine Mountain district was later dissolved by the council, the lodge chose to retain Magazine Mountain as a chapter of its lodge, leaving the number of chapters in the lodge at five.

The first Ordeal was large for a young lodge, with one hundred twenty-two new members inducted. Magazine Mountain had thirty-two candidates, Northwest had thirty-nine, Ozark thirty-three, and Butterfield Trail had twenty-eight. Neighboring Quapaw Lodge 160 conducted the Ordeal ceremony for the new lodge.

BIG CHANGES IN THE OA'S NEXT CENTURY

In 2017, the Boy Scouts of America announced that girls would be allowed to join its age 11-17 program, and with this change, girls also would be eligible for election into the Order of the Arrow. In February 2019, the first girls joined the re-named “Scouts BSA”, and Westark Area Council soon welcomed its first girl members. Beginning with the 2019-20 unit-election cycle, the first girls were elected as Ordeal candidates to the lodge, but there was a global storm looming on the horizon: the COVID-19 virus. The COVID-19 virus took hold in early 2020, and by March 2020, the entire world was in the grip of an unprecedented pandemic that caused government-mandated

quarantines to be imposed. Schools, churches, and businesses across the United States shut down, which caused Scouting programs to be shut down as well. The lodge was faced with the inability to induct new members, and with unit camping shut down, Scout eligibility for the Order would be affected as well.

In response to the pandemic, the National Committee of the Order of the Arrow eased camping requirements, including allowing “virtual” camping nights to count toward the camping requirement. Thousands of Scouts camped out in their backyards concurrently with other members of their units while staying in touch via the Zoom videoconferencing platform. Virtual camping and the ability to meet virtually via Zoom allowed Scouts to stay active during the quarantine. Later in 2020, as a response to shutdown of most Scout camps and all high adventure bases, the National Committee eased the long-term camp requirement for election, opening the possibility for more Scouts to be eligible for election to the OA.

Fortunately, the lodge completed its unit elections in February before the pandemic hit. However, with the cancellation of all Council events, there was no way to induct candidates. The National Committee soon issued modifications that allowed for “virtual” inductions. Candidates would be allowed to complete the tests of the Ordeal individually or in small, “socially distanced” groups, with the Pre-Ordeal and Ordeal ceremonies viewed live over the Zoom platform in candidates’ homes. The lodge took advantage of this, and on October 2-3, 2020, the lodge held its first Virtual Induction Weekend. During this event, the lodge inducted thirty-seven new Ordeal members; included in this number were seven girls, who were the first girl members of Westark Area Council inducted into the lodge. Soon after the virtual event, new Ordeal member Naomi Liljenberg was appointed to the vacant Lodge Treasurer position, becoming the first girl member to sit on the Lodge Executive Committee.

August of 2020 saw the Lodge participate in a “virtual” Section 8 Conclave; on the strength of enthusiastic participation by the Lodge’s Arrowmen in such online activities as Memories, Minecraft clip art competition, and trivia games, as well as our Lodge’s first-rate electronic and social media presence, the Lodge won the coveted Golden Arrow as the top lodge in the Section.

In November 2020, the lodge held its first live induction event in over a year. Using protocols designed to reduce the chance of spreading COVID-19, including pre-screening, temperature checks, masks, social distancing, sanitizing, and other measures, the lodge held a safe induction weekend that featured Ordeal, Brotherhood, and Vigil inductions.

In December 2020, Arrowman Kat Singleton achieved the Eagle Scout rank, becoming the first girl Eagle Scout of Westark Area Council.

EMERGING FROM THE PANDEMIC & NEW GROWTH

In April 2021, as the COVID-19 pandemic eased, the lodge held its first Spring Induction Weekend in over two years, hosting over 200 participants, including seventy-four Ordeal candidates, twenty-seven Brotherhood candidates, and six Vigil Honor candidates. At this event, Razorback Chapter made lodge history when it fielded the Lodge’s first all-girl ceremony team. On April 9, 2021, Ella Downum, Essa Downum, Frances Garner, and Naomi Liljenberg performed the Pre-Ordeal

ceremony for three groups of Ordeal candidates. Later during the weekend, the lodge welcomed its first girl Brotherhood members as many virtual inductees sealed their membership in the Order.

In July 2022, after a four-year wait, thousands of Arrowmen from across the country again gathered for the National Order of the Arrow Conference at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, Tennessee. The Lodge sent a contingent, among whom were the members of the Razorback Chapter Ceremony Team. During the ceremony competition, the team, this time consisting of Ella Downum, Essa Downum, Naomi Liljenberg, and Emily Williams, achieved the highest rating for their Pre-Ordeal Ceremony. They were the first all-girl ceremony team in the history of the Order of the Arrow to achieve the highest rating.

In April 2023, at the Spring Induction Weekend at Camp Orr, the Lodge called out and inducted its first youth girl Vigil Honor members, Naomi Liljenberg and Addison Moll, together with five other exemplary Arrowmen.

At the 2023 Section G4 Conclave held May 5-7 at Camp Tom Hale in Oklahoma, the Lodge dominated ceremony and Quest Games competitions as well as other categories to capture the Golden Arrow as the top lodge in Section G4. Razorback Chapter won the Unit Election ceremony competition, Ozark Chapter won the Pre-Ordeal ceremony competition, and Arrowmen from across the Lodge joined together to win three out of four Quest Games competitions. In addition, Emily Williams won recognition as the Best Female Dancer.

The final activity at the 2023 Conclave was the Section G4 business meeting. At the meeting, Lodge Chief Berkeley Wasson was elected Section G4 Vice-Chief; he and the other new Section officers were sworn in by OA National Chief Zach Grinvalsky and OA National Vice-Chief (and former Section G4 Chief) Grant Kim. Berkeley became the first Section Vice-Chief from the Lodge in ten years.

REGIONS AND SECTIONS OF THE LODGE

Over the years, the lodge has belonged to different regions and sections of the Order of the Arrow. When the lodge was founded in 1963, it became part of Region Five, Section 5a. In 1973 the Boy Scouts of America and the Order of the Arrow reduced the number of regions from twelve to six. The lodge was placed in the South-Central Region and in section SC-1a. In 1983, the section was renamed SC-2. In 1988 the lodge was moved to SC-3. In 1993, the Boy Scouts of America and the Order of the Arrow consolidated the six regions into the four that exist currently. The lodge became a member of the new Southern Region and was assigned to section SR-3. In 1996, SR-3 was split, and the lodge became a member of section SR-3b. In 2004, sections SR-3a and SR-3b were merged back into SR-3. In 2008, the region underwent a realignment and SR-3 was renamed SR-8. Following the BSA's consolidation of its four regions into two, the Eastern Region and the Gateway Region, the Lodge became a part of the Gateway Region, and SR-8 was renamed Section G4. Section G4 is home to Wachtschu Mawachpo and most of the other lodges from across Arkansas and Oklahoma.

NATIONAL AWARDS

CENTURION AWARD

The Centurion Award was a one-time recognition associated with the centennial anniversary of the Order of the Arrow that was bestowed upon a few exemplary Arrowmen from each lodge by the national Order of the Arrow committee. It was modeled after a similar program in the BSA's 100th anniversary celebration, the 2010 National Hall of Leadership. Accordingly, this recognition was an opportunity to highlight lodge development over the last century and the many individuals, both youth and adult, who were instrumental in its success. The honorees should have provided significant contributions to the lodge's legacy. Furthermore, the honorees will serve as examples of leadership to all Arrowmen who come after them, modeling to others a commitment to cheerful service as the Order of the Arrow enters its second century. Our lodge nominated two Arrowmen: Arthur Anderson and R. Brian Naylor.

ARTHUR ANDERSON (ADULT)

Arthur Anderson was the driving force in the founding of Wachtschu Mawachpo Lodge 559 in 1963 and served as its Lodge Adviser for seventeen years. He inspired two lodge chiefs, Tim Osborn and R. Brian Naylor, to fulfill their dreams of becoming South Central Region Chiefs. Anderson led numerous contingents to NOAC, providing transportation and encouragement. He inspired young men, bringing out the best in them to achieve great things. In 1976, the lodge earned the E. Urner Goodman Camping Award under his tutelage. Anderson continued to serve the lodge even after he stepped down as lodge adviser until the year he passed away. He was noted for waking up early on induction weekends to personally hand each ordeal candidate their breakfast because he believed it to be his duty to serve others. He practiced our founder's teaching, "For he who serves his fellows, is of all his fellows greatest." Anderson was one of the greatest of our Order, and his spirit of servant leadership lives on in the lives of the young men he served as they now serve the youth of our lodge.

RICHARD BRIAN NAYLOR (YOUTH)

As a youth, Richard Brian Naylor led Wachtschu Mawachpo lodge to unprecedented participation levels resulting in a resurgence in ceremony and dance teams. He was instrumental in the creation of the first *Where to go Camping Guide* for the lodge and was part of the team that developed the Elangomat and extended Elangomat program for the lodge and section. His legacy as lodge chief inspired those that followed in his footsteps to push themselves in service to the lodge. Naylor went on to hold leadership positions as section chief and South-Central region chief. He received the Arrowman of the Year Award and the Founders Award from Wachtschu Mawachpo lodge and was honored in 1988 at the National Order of the Arrow Conference with the Distinguished Service Award for his service as region chief.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

The Distinguished Service Award was created in 1940 to honor those Arrowmen who have rendered distinguished and outstanding service to the Order of the Arrow on a Sectional, Regional, or National basis. The Distinguished Service Award is presented at the National Order of the Arrow Conference, and to date, only around 1,000 awards have been given to youth and adult Arrowmen. FOUNDER'S AWARD

The Founder's Award is the highest honor that may be given at the lodge level and is a nationally recognized award in the Order of the Arrow. Introduced at the 1981 National Order of the Arrow Conference, the Founder's Award recognizes Arrowmen who have given outstanding service to their lodge. The award is reserved for an Arrowman who demonstrates that he or she personifies the spirit of selfless service, as advocated by founder E. Urner Goodman and cofounder Carroll A. Edson. Wachtschu Mawachpo Lodge may petition the National Order of the Arrow Committee to present two awards each year, one of which must be presented to a youth member less than twenty-one years of age.
